

At the Faculty of History, Arts and Oriental Studies the following Junior Professorship has to be filled as soon as possible:

W1- Junior Professorship Study of Religions

(Position will be offered for 3 years and is extendable another 3 years after successful evaluation.)

The position is to represent the Institute for the Study of Religions in the field of General and Comparative Study of Religions in research and teaching. Applicants are expected to have expertise in the theory and method of the study of religions as well as competence in at least one field of historical or empirical research in religion.

Prerequisites for admission are a university degree in the study of religions or a comparable degree and a doctoral degree in the study of religions as well as university didactic competence. The responsibilities of the jobholder include administration and teaching in the degree program Study of Religions. The readiness for active participation in the academic self-governance of the Institute for the Study of Religions as well as the active acquisition of third-party funding is expected. In addition, a content-related connection to the strategic research field of the University of Leipzig "Changed Order in a Globalized World" and especially to the profile area "Global Connections and Comparisons" is expected.

Rights and obligations of the jobholder are within the Saxonian university law (SächsHSFG) §§ 63, 64, 70 and the Saxonian public service task regulation (Sächsische Dienstaufgabenverordnung, DAVOHS). Applicants must meet the requirements of § 63 SächsHSFG.

The junior professorship is considered a position for post-doctoral qualification. Therefore, the call is addressed to applicants with a completed doctoral degree, attributed with magna cum laude or higher, who seek further qualification and have not yet completed a habilitation. If applicants were employed as research associates or research assistants prior to or after completion of their doctoral studies, the total period of employment and work on the doctoral thesis should not exceed six years.

The University of Leipzig emphasizes the equality of women and men. Handicapped applicants are encouraged to apply and given preference if equally qualified.

Purpose and legal basis of the processing of personal data:

Any data you provide us with in connection with your application will be processed only for the purposes of this selection process and, where appropriate, in preparation for your employment. The legal basis of the processing of your personal data for appointing civil servants/for employment-related purposes is Art. 6(1) Sentence 1(e) in conjunction with (3), Art. 88 GDPR in conjunction with Sect. 111(6) of the Saxon Civil Servants Act (SächsBG) in conjunction with Sect. 4(1) Sentence 1 of the Saxon Data Protection Act (SächsDSG), and Sect. 26 of the German Federal Data Protection Act (BDSG). Insofar as you provide special categories of personal data during the application procedure within the meaning of Art. 9(1) GDPR (e.g. data concerning health, such as severely disabled status), that data will be processed so that you can exercise your rights in the field of employment and social security and social protection law and so that the controllers can carry out their obligations in this regard under employment and social welfare law (Art. 9(2)(b) GDPR).

Disclosure to third parties:

Your application documents will be made available to the members of the appointment committee, which is composed of representatives of Leipzig University, the participating Equal Opportunity Commissioner, the Disability Officer(s) if involved, the appointment officer, external assessors, the Rectorate, the Faculty and University administration and the Saxon State Ministry of Science and the Arts (SMWK).

Personal data storage period:

The duration of the storage of personal data is governed by Sect. 11(4) of the Saxon Data Protection Implementation Act (SächsDSDG). This stipulates that data collected prior to the commencement of a service or employment relationship must be erased without undue delay as soon as it is established that a service or employment relationship will not be established. This does not apply if there is reason to believe that the erasure would harm the legitimate interests of the data subject.

If your application is successful, your documents will be added to your personnel file.

Your rights:

You have the following rights vis-à-vis the controller with regard to your personal data:

- Right of access (Art. 15 GDPR)
- Right to rectification (Art. 16 GDPR)
- Right to erasure (Art. 17 GDPR)
- Right to restriction of processing (Art. 18 GDPR)
- Right to data portability (Art. 20 GDPR)
- Right to object to data processing, where the data is collected based on Article 6(1) Sentence 1(e) or (f) (Art. 21 GDPR)
- Right to lodge a complaint with the competent supervisory authority (Saxon Commissioner for Data Protection, Bernhard-von-Lindenau-Platz 5, 01067 Dresden) (Art. 77 GDPR).

Obligation to provide data:

The provision of personal data is necessary to ensure the legality of the planned selection process. Failure to include relevant personal data in the application documents may result in your application not being considered for the post. Leipzig University's legal requirements during the selection process result in particular from Art. 33(2) of the Basic Law (GG), the Constitution of the Free State of Saxony (SächsVerf), the General Act on Equal Treatment (AGG), the Saxon Freedom of Higher Education Act (SächsHSFG), and budgetary law.
